Safeguarding and Child Protection at Charlton Park Academy

The leadership team has ensured that safeguarding arrangements are fit for purpose. Leaders and governors regularly review and strengthen school procedures to ensure that safeguarding remains the upmost priority. For example, you have recently increased the number of deputy designated leads. They work together effectively with the designated lead to oversee and promote pupils' safety and welfare.

Safeguarding and Child Protection are the most important aspect of the work we do at Charlton Park Academy. If a young person does not feel safe then they will not be able to learn. The Academy operates a policy of restricting unsupervised access to students to only those who have been correctly vetted.

As a parent/carer of a student at Charlton Park Academy if you feel a young person is at risk or is the subject of abuse you should contact the school and ask to speak to the Designated Safeguarding Lead for Child Protection straight away. We will discuss your concerns with you in confidence and consider

the best way to address the issues raised. This may involve sharing the information further with other professionals.

We are totally committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children, young people and vulnerable adults.

Enrichment and Additional Services

Schemes

Our summer play scheme is for children of all disabilities and provides them with the opportunity to socialise with other young people from around the borough. Each day the children will be collected by CPA buses and brought to Charlton Park Academy. The scheme is based at Charlton Park Academy, but there are also off-site activities such as bowling, days out to theme parks and the seaside.

MOVE

MOVE is an acronym for Mobility Opportunities Via Education. It is a programme that uses the education system to teach disabled children the skills of sitting, standing, walking and transferring. It brings the students, their families, the teaching staff and relevant therapists together in order to work toward a shared, functional goal e.g. for a student to be able to feed themselves, maintain an erect head position in order to watch TV or be able to take trips out with their families without relying on a wheelchair. Charlton Park Academy is extremely committed to using MOVE. We were the first school to be awarded the MOVE quality mark and we are also a MOVF Centre of Excellence.

Rainbow House

As part of our commitment to the wellbeing of our students and their families and carers we have our own residential provision, Rainbow House.

It extends educational opportunities and promotes pupil independence skills for medically complex and profoundly disabled young people on an extended day and overnight basis during term time. It is attached to Charlton Park Academy and is a homely purpose built provision to accommodate up to 12 children with SEN statements

Parent/Carer Support Group

At Charlton Park Academy our support group aims to encourage and support a positive home and school relationship. Therefore, parents/carers feedback on what they require from this group is important to us. We hold regular talks, advice workshops, art and craft courses plus informal sessions. This has been beneficial and successful in building friendships and encouraging communication between home and school.

Post 16

At Year 11 our students and their families have the opportunity to consider the next steps they want to take in education.

We offer a challenging, yet supportive Post-16 environment where all students are encouraged to maximise their knowledge and skills, including both self-confidence and personal aspirations, and so enable their future participation in both local communities and wider society.

Assistive Technology

CENMAC is a support and advice service based within Charlton Park Academy. CENMAC are able to work with staff and students in the use of assistive technology* to support their learning. CENMAC is able to loan a range of equipment which is particularly useful when trials are needed to find the best possible solution.

Charlton Park Bees

Together with our successful organic gardens and vegetable growing, as part of Capital Growth initiative – we are trying to improve our garden ecosystem by keeping friendly Brown Honey Bees on site. Our new Flow Hives are producing some fresh honey for students to enjoy.
